First up, it's been just over a week since the general election when adults voted for who they wanted to run the UK. An overwhelming majority chose the Labour Party, meaning their leader, Sir Keir Starmer, became the new prime minister. Under-18s couldn't vote. But that didn't stop thousands of you having your say in a huge mock election in England and Wales. Called Our Generation Our Vote. But how did the results of these two very different elections compare? Did you vote for the same parties as the adults?

Well, we've been analysing the results. First up, the mock election. The Labour Party won this with almost 32% of your votes, followed very closely by the Green Party with 29%.

The Liberal Democrats, Reform UK, and the Conservatives made up the rest of the top five. Now let's compare that with how the adults voted in the real thing. Labour won seats for 412 MPs in the House of Commons, taking almost 34% of the votes.

The Conservatives were second with 121 MPs and just under 24% of the votes.

The Liberal Democrats came third with the Scottish National Party and Sinn Fein making up the top five. In contrast to the mock election, Reform UK were in seventh place. They got five MPs and the Green Party were ninth with four MPs.

So although the order of the parties is quite different between the two elections, the actual winner was exactly the same with the Labour Party coming out on top.

Some of the differences are down to what's called the first past the post system in the real election. It means only the winning party in each area gets an MP in Parliament.

For instance, the Greens got a lot of votes, but in the areas they came second, they didn't get anything for it.
