And they're getting help from actual Silverstone professionals.

How is the work that you're doing here with Lego cars similar to the work that you do with the real race cars?

So they have to think about ways to make it go faster, but also how many Lego blocks and stuff they're using to reduce the kind of weight and material that they use on the car.

What advice would you give to young people who might want to do what you do?

So 100% pursue STEM subject matters. as well as car building and computer coding.

The pupils here are getting hands on with another vital role that is needed in motorsport.

Did you know that there are always paramedics on the sidelines at a racetrack in case of any accidents?

So these guys are getting to learn some vital first aid.

Right.

And we couldn't take a look at the world of motorsport without trying some driving. And simulators like these are a vital part of the drivers race preparation. What's more, e-sports or electronic sports are video games are played competitively and it's massive now with huge events that take place all over the world. Some e-sport champions have actually become racecar drivers themselves.

Right. So what are you doing?

I'm just trying to drive the car. It's like, really difficult. Yeah. And when you go over things, you can feel it as well. You can feel it.

Three, two, one, Go. No, I'm not winning.

Maybe I'll just stick to presenting. Speaking of which, another really important part of racing is presenting and commentating. And I actually get to do both of these for Sky Sports and Formula One.
